The Dean asks the canon to make the Chapter Declaration.*

I, Kenneth Arthur Lambart Barrett

do declare that I will perform canonical obedience to the Dean of this Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity, commonly called Christ Church Dublin, and to his successors lawfully entering.

I will observe the statutes and ancient customs of this Cathedral Church and I will use my endeavours for the preservation of this ancient foundation. And the secrets of the Chapter, so long as they continue to be secrets, I will keep private and undisclosed unless summoned by law to divulge them.

*The Dean then asks the canon to sign the Chapter Roll.
The Dean leads the canon to his stall and seats him with prayer, and says:*

I, Dermot Patrick Martin Dunne, Dean of this Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity, commonly called Christ Church Dublin, do receive and install you

into the real, actual and corporal possession of the dignity and office of canon, with all and singular the rights, members and appurtenances thereunto belonging; and I do assign you this stall customarily assigned to the 12th canon in the Choir of this Cathedral Church; and your place and voice in the Chapter of this Cathedral Church; and do leave you in the quiet and peaceable possession of the same. In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

The Lord preserve your going out, and your coming in, from this time forth for evermore. **Amen.**

We have heard with our ears, O God, our fathers have told us: what thou hast done in their time of old; How thou hast driven out the heathen with thy hand, and planted them in: how thou hast destroyed the nations and cast them out. For they gat not the land in possession through their own sword: neither was it their own arm that helped them; But thy right hand, and thine arm, and the light of thy countenance: because thou hadst a favour unto them. Thou art my King, O God: send help unto Jacob. Through thee will we overthrow our enemies: and in thy Name will we tread them under, that rise up against us. For I will not trust in my bow: it is not my sword that shall help me; But it is thou that savest us from our enemies: and putttest them to confusion that hate us. We make our boast of God all day long: and will praise thy Name for ever. But now thou art far off, and putttest us to confusion: and goest not forth with our armies. Thou makest us to turn our backs upon our enemies: so that they which hate us spoil our goods. Thou letttest us be eaten up like sheep: and hast scattered us among the heathen. Thou sellest thy people for nought: and takest no money for them. Thou makest us to be rebuked of our neighbours: to be laughed to scorn, and had in derision of them that are round about us. Thou makest us to be a by-word among the heathen: and that the people shake their heads at us. 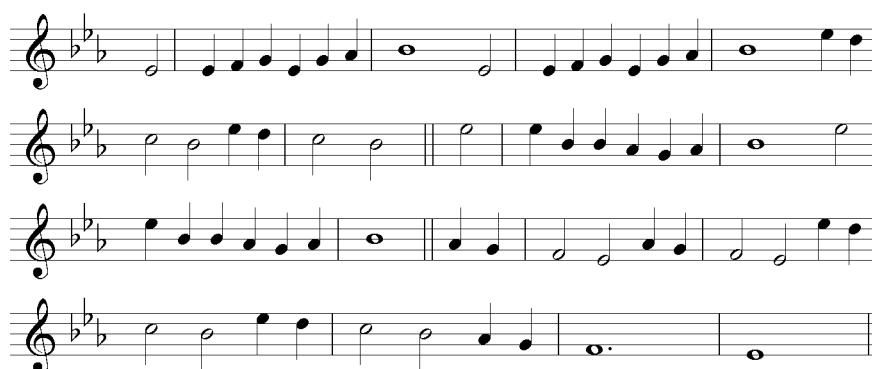
