

woven into the dream.


Here we feel the hint of heaven,

The Gospel

Luke 10: 25-37

The gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

All turn to face the reader

An expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbour as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

But wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came upon him, and when he saw him he was moved with compassion. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, treating them with oil and wine. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him, and when I come back I

will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

This is the gospel of the Lord.

Prayers of Intercession

Leader 1 We are in the presence of Holy God who has created each and every one of us in God's image. We bow our heads in shame that racism and exclusion continue to be endemic in our society.

Leader 2 Our service this evening has been prepared by the Council of Churches of Minnesota.
We stand in solidarity with them, our siblings in Christ. We remember George Floyd, slowly choked to death. *(Pause)*
Outrage resounded throughout the world, proclaiming "Black Lives Matter!" We are grateful for that.

We honour all those people who are and have been victims of racism and xenophobia.

We fall silent, and acknowledge that many of their names are not known, many of their stories not heard, justice not delivered *(Pause)*

We remember and honour parents and friends of those whose lives were snuffed out, we remember and honour all who fight tirelessly for justice.

Leader 1 We pray that their suffering may bring forth the fruit of transformation and justice.

Leader 2 Finally, we remember and honour all victims of prejudice, injustice, abuse, bullying or violence of any kind. We ask Christ crucified to bless them, give them strength, lead them to freedom, and we commit ourselves to tirelessly do what we can that those bound by injustice be released.
