GENERAL INFORMATION

Providing music details

Any music choices must be approved in advance by the Music Department, therefore we request that visiting choirs send their music details at least two months before the date of the visit to allow time for any necessary changes to be made. All visiting choirs singing during the summer months are asked to provide music details by late May or two months before the visit, whichever is soonest.

The schedule of services

The normal weekly schedule of services is as follows:

Wednesday	18:00	Choral Evensong
Thursday	18:00	Choral Evensong
Sunday	11:00	Cathedral Eucharist
Sunday	15:30	Choral Evensong

There is also the option of singing a Saturday lunchtime concert. These events are organised by Sophie Gough, who can be contacted at sophie.gough@christchurch.com

Repertoire

When choosing repertoire, please give precedence to the quality of the musical performance. Experience has shown us that the best results are achieved when choirs sing music well within their capabilities, rather than attempting overly ambitious repertoire that overstretches the musicians; pieces of a modest scale are always acceptable. Please take care to ensure that the music chosen is appropriate to the day and season. If the Music Department feels that any item is inappropriate we will ask you to make an alternative choice.

Choir rehearsals

Choirs will normally be given use of the Music Room above the Chapter House. Choirs will be provided with codes to the Music Room door upon arrival. The Dean and Chapter accept no liability for loss or damage to items left in the Music Room. Choirs must also ensure that the room is left tidy, and that any of the Cathedral Choir's music is left in place and undisturbed.

Choirs may normally rehearse in the cathedral during the following times (these times may be subject to alteration):

Sunday	9:45–10:45
Monday–Friday	16:45–17:45

On the day of your arrival at the cathedral please allow about 15 minutes before your rehearsal begins to be greeted by a member of the Music Department and to practise the procession and have any parts of the service explained to you.

Choirs should be assembled at the bottom of the stairs to the Music Room at least 5 minutes before each service is scheduled to begin.

The organist may rehearse from 16:00 for weekday Evensong, 9:00 for Sunday Eucharist, and 13:30 for Sunday Evensong. Some additional practise time may be available, please contact the Music Department if you wish to avail of this. During weekdays please play softly and stop for 12:00 prayers and 12:45 Eucharist in the Lady Chapel.

Practise time cannot always be guaranteed, so it is essential for organists to arrive as prepared as possible, and to make sure that their practise time is booked in advance of the visit.

Clothing

Visiting choirs are invited to wear what they would usually wear for services, though choirs need not robe if they do not normally do so. In the event that a choir are not robed, smart attire is necessary. The Cathedral does not allow visiting choirs to borrow robes from the Cathedral Choir. 'Quiet' footwear is recommended, and ladies are requested to avoid heels which may damage the stonework; flat and sensible shoes are required. Choristers should wear one medal only; academic hoods are not worn during Eucharist.

Accompanists

The majority of choirs bring their own accompanist. One of the Cathedral organists will normally be available to play if preferred, although most directors may prefer an accompanist with whom they are more familiar. If you require one of the Cathedral organists to play there will be an extra charge for any service other than on a Sunday. You can discuss this when making your application.

Psalms and Hymns

All psalms are sung to Anglican chant. You are free to choose any chant you want and we will supply the pointed text. All psalms follow the Church of Ireland lectionary.

The primary hymnals used by the Cathedral are the *New English Hymnal* and the *Irish Church Hymnal*. The hymns are set by the Music Department, the melodies and texts of which will be sent to you in advance and you are free to choose the harmony. All hymn texts and melodies are printed in the service sheet.

Other than the Communion Hymn (which may be accompanied or unaccompanied, depending on where it is being sung) the hymns are intended to be congregational. For that reason, complicated arrangements that would make it

difficult for the congregation to join in must be avoided. Verses in other congregational hymns must not be left unaccompanied, nor accompanied so lightly that the congregation is inhibited.

Copyright

The Cathedral takes the issue of copyright seriously and you are encouraged to ensure that any music you reproduce is done so with the permission of the publishers, or under existing copyright rules.

Cantor

The Cathedral will not be able to guarantee a cantor for intonations with the exception of the Dismissal at Eucharist which is usually sung by the celebrant or one of the assisting clergy. Therefore you must delegate intonations to a member of your choir.

Refreshments

There is a kitchen in the Chapter House which your choir are welcome to use for tea, coffee, or water. There are many places near the Cathedral for buying food and drink and some restaurants and other amenities are listed in the appendix of this handbook.

After Sunday Eucharist your choir are encouraged to join members of the congregation in the Crypt for tea, coffee, and biscuits which are provided by the Friends of the Cathedral. This is a good opportunity to meet members of the Cathedral community.

We would request that choirs refrain from taking food and drink into the choir stalls.

Toilets

Toilets are situated in the Chapter House just inside the door through which you enter.

Webcam

Please be aware that all services are live-streamed on the Cathedral website via a webcam. The services are not recorded.

Transport and Parking

Christ Church is located in the heart of the city centre and is easily accessed from outside the city centre by transport links. Transport links on a Sunday are considerably less frequent so we recommend planning your journey in advance and aiming to arrive earlier than necessary to avoid delays.

Parking on the Cathedral grounds may not be possible, especially during busy times. There is a multi-story carpark within two minutes walking distance from the Cathedral which choir members may avail of at a discounted rate. If you intend on using this facility please make it known to a member of the office staff before your visit.

Entry to the Cathedral

When you arrive at the Cathedral you will be let in through the Chapter House door. This is situated directly opposite the main gate to the Cathedral. Upon your arrival press the Music Room bell and a member of staff will let you in.

NOTES FOR ORGANISTS

Hymns

A copy of the *New English Hymnal* and the *Irish Church Hymnal* can be found in the organ loft in the small cabinet to the right of the console.

Camera

There is a screen on the console with video link to the Quire. This is turned on at the monitor. There are two camera settings, one focusing on the Quire and the other behind the Screen. This can be changed by pressing the → or ← direction buttons on the device on top of the cabinet to the right of the console. This device can be temperamental so please avoid moving the device or the stand on which it is kept.

Organ Practice

The organist may rehearse from 16:00 for weekday Evensong, 9:00 for Sunday Eucharist, and 13:30 for Sunday Evensong. Some additional practice time may be available but this must be arranged before your arrival in consultation with the Music Department. During weekdays please play softly so as not to disturb the tours, and stop for 12:00 prayers and 12:45 for said Eucharist in the Lady Chapel.

Practice time cannot be guaranteed, so it is essential for organists to arrive as prepared as possible, and to make sure that their practice time is booked in advance of the visit.

Pistons

You will be provided with a memory card which gives you access to channels 15–60. Channels are changed using the control panel on the right. Divisional pistons have a standard accompaniment setting which must not be altered. There are forward and reverse pistons which act as a stepper through the general pistons. If

the card is not inserted you are using memory setting 1 and these must not be altered. The tremulants cannot be set on pistons.

Voluntaries

You may play as much or as little music before Evensong as you wish, but you must play as the choir and clergy process into the cathedral and it must be finished by the time the choir arrive in the stalls and the procession is over.

Before Eucharist on Sunday you may play after the choir rehearsal up until you see a member of the clergy enter the Quire on your monitor. You must then stop to allow for announcements to be made and keep silence until the Processional Hymn. A member of the clergy will give the signal to begin the Processional Hymn by lighting the green light to the left of the keyboard.

After the said 'Grace' at Evensong, and after the choir have sung the dismissal response at Eucharist you may begin the voluntary immediately. Voluntaries should be long enough to give time for the procession to leave the Nave (usually at least 3 minutes). Please take care when choosing your voluntary to ensure it is of an appropriate scale to each service.

Hymn play-overs

Play-overs should provide appropriate introductions to the hymns (usually the first one or two lines, sometimes the last one or two). Unless the melody is relatively short and likely to be unfamiliar to the congregation, it is not necessary to play over the whole verse. If the hymn is shorter it may be necessary to improvise after the final verse to cover collection (during Offertory Hymn) or the end of the processional hymn at Eucharist.

ORDER OF SERVICE FOR CHORAL EUCHARIST

Time: 11:00am

Organ music stops when the celebrating priest walks through the Quire and into the nave, and is followed by the Welcome and Notices. The choir assemble behind the organ in line for procession.

The organ begins the Processional Hymn which is sung by choir and congregation whilst processing. Once the choir have entered the stalls, all bow together.

Greeting, Call to Penitence, followed immediately by the Kyrie

Absolution

Gloria sung by the choir. Intonation sung by member of the choir.

Collect of the Day

Old Testament Lesson

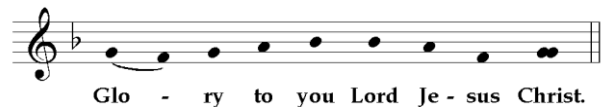
Psalm sung by the choir (We provide the text)

New Testament Lesson

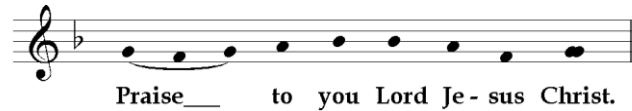

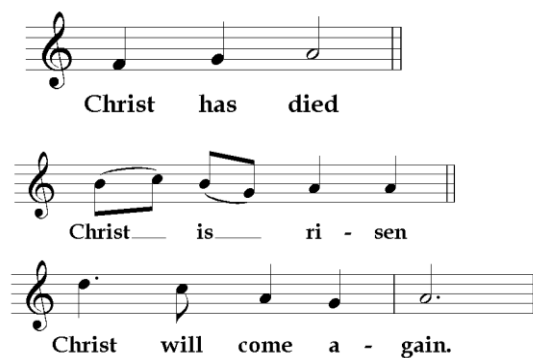

After the Eucharist has passed through the choir into the nave the choir leave the stalls and exit into the transepts and receive communion or sit in the transepts until all choir members who wish to receive communion have returned. The choir will then return to the stalls to sing the Communion Hymn followed by the Motet. After this the choir remain seated in silence.

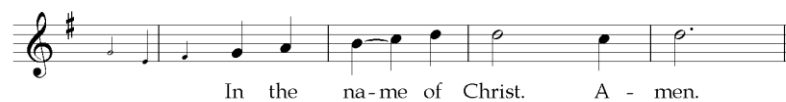
Organ music to cover the choir receiving communion if there are still people receiving after the Hymn and Motet.
